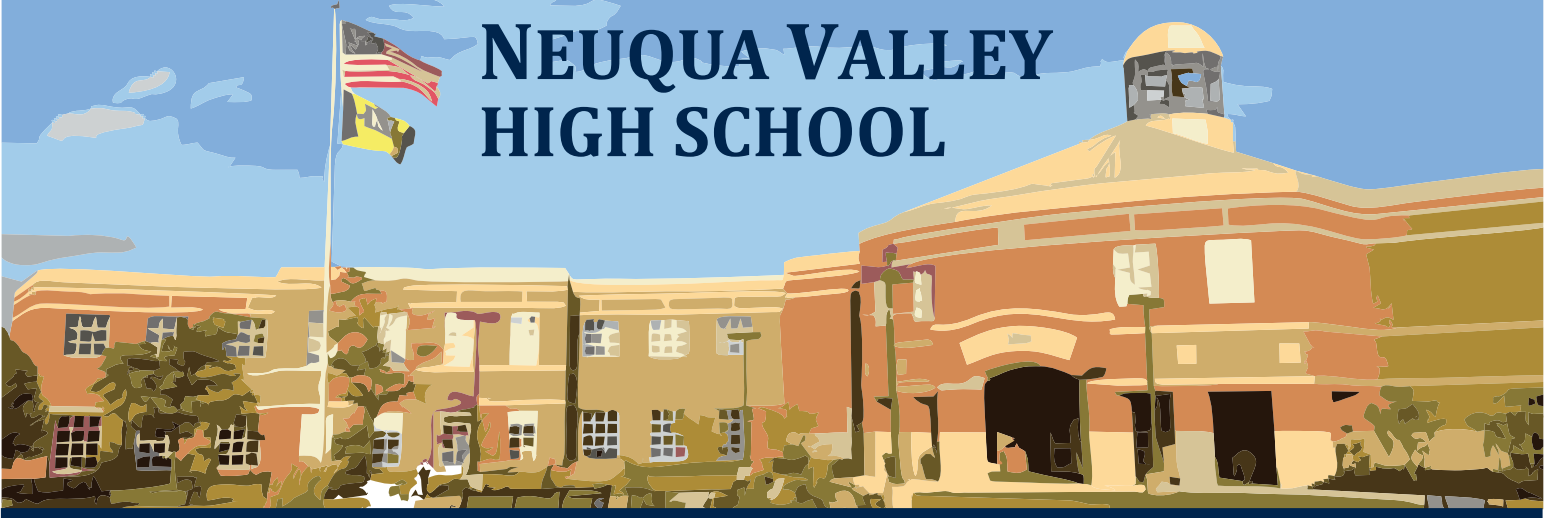

Indian Prairie School District has its own local honor society call the Indian Prairie Scholar program. The criteria for membership is to achieve a 3.6 or higher cumulative GPA after 7 semesters. Indian Prairie Scholars are encouraged to perform service activities in the community to enhance their opportunities to grow as young leaders.

CURRICULUM

Neuqua Valley High School provides a rigorous college preparatory curriculum, offering more than 200 courses to students. These opportunities are centered around the needs of students, Common Core State Standards, and other college-readiness standards.

AP, Honors and PLTW (Project Lead the Way) courses are the most challenging courses offered at Neuqua Valley. These courses are accelerated and weighted by +1.0 on the GPA.
